THE WIND

Since ancient times, the wind has made its presence felt in myths and omens. Because it moved so swiftly, people compared it to an invisible messenger, and because it kept changing, they gave it many different names to match every shade of its mood.

The wind can be both constructive and destructive. It can lift a kite playfully or split a cargo ship apart, carry a seed for hundreds of kilometres or become a poetic metaphor. A breath of air that flows with life and energy.

In Greek mythology, the god Aeolus ruled the winds of the Mediterranean Sea. He kept them in a leather bag, which he gave to the hero Ulysses to help him steer his ship safely back to Ithaca. But while Ulysses was sleeping, his companions opened the bag and all the winds escaped: they blew out into the air and over the sea, taking the sailors' hopes of return with them ...

In those days long ago, there was nothing more mysterious than the wind. It couldn't be seen, although its impact was obvious. It was difficult to measure, unpredictable and dangerous.

But in modern times, advances in meteorology (the science of the weather) began to reveal the wind's secrets: more and more sophisticated technical instruments have helped us to measure and classify winds, so now we can understand what makes the air above our heads move in so many different ways.

The Tower of the Winds in Athens, Greece was built in about 50 BCE by the astronomer Andronicus of Cyrrhus. The eight-sided building is made of marble and covered with carvings. It combines everything people knew at that time about weather, mechanics and astronomy with ancient myths associated with the wind. The complex mechanism inside the tower could calculate the time of day and the turning of the seasons... and even produce horoscopes?

The kite was invented about 2,800 years ago. To begin with, it was not just a toy that could be flown for fun: it could be used to send coded messages or to calculate the distance between two places, as well as to measure the wind's strength.







TORNADO OR TROPICAL CYCLONE?

Tornadoes and cyclones are two devastating events that have a terrifying reputation all over the world. They can appear to be similar but in fact they are quite different.

Tropical cyclones

Tropical cyclones (also called hurricanes) form between 5° and 30° latitude, north and south of the Equator, over warm tropical waters where the air in contact with the water heats and rises. The surrounding surface air replaces the air that has risen: this too becomes warm and rises, full of moisture. This process keeps repeating, creating an updraft that reaches high levels. As it cools, it condenses, forming clouds.

Because of the Coriolis force, the rising air starts to spiral. Its centre is an almost calm zone: that's the eye of the cyclone forming. When a cyclone moves towards colder water or touches land, its strength reduces and eventually it dies down.

Tornadoes


Tornadoes (or twisters) form within very violent thunderstorms (called supercells) when spiralling movements develop. These may be caused by the contrast between the storm's rising and sinking air or they could form at the same time as the storm itself.


Cold currents of air at a high altitude also help tornadoes to form: these winds make the thundercloud (синидонінівия) spin, encouraging the development of a tornado.

The Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Wind Scale measures how strong a hurricane is by looking at its wind speeds. It helps predict how much damage and flooding the hurricane might cause when it hits land.


LASER

SPOTTING

Turning quickly can make you dizzy, so ballet dancers use a technique called 'spotting' to help them keep their balance as they spin.

Spotting is the number one skill to master when performing any pirouette or turn.





JUMPS

Jumps are the closest thing we humans can do to give the illusion of flying. Dancers who are able to combine coordination with strength can appear as though they are suspended in the air.

TEMPS LEVÉ

A graceful hop, starting on one foot and landing on that same foot.

PETIT NLLEGRO

Petit means little, while allegro means quick. In ballet we use this term to refer to a series of small, quick jumps, linking the five main families of jumps together.

SISSONNE

A jump starting on two feet and landing on a single foot.

Are humans related to apes?

'Are we monkeys?' 'Was my great-grandma a gorilla?' I'm often asked these questions in schools. In a way, the answer is ... yes! If we go back a very long way, then we are all related. All great apes share a common ancestor, a primate, from over 20 million years ago.



Human evolution

Researchers still don't know exactly when the first humans evolved. One of the earliest known is Homo habilis, or 'handy man,' who lived about 2 million years ago in eastern and southern Africa. Others include Homo erectus, or 'upright man', who roamed in Africa all the way to China and Indonesia about 1.9 million to 100,000 years ago, before going extinct.



Homo neanderthalensis, often called Neanderthals, were probably the closest relatives to modern humans. They lived in Europe and parts of Asia between 400,000 and 40,000 years ago. They were skilled at hunting large Ice-Age animals like bison and woolly rhinos, and archaeologists now think that they communicated with language and had their own culture.



Shared DNA

Evidence suggests that humans and chimpanzees diverged from a common ancestor about 6 million years ago. Today, humans and chimps share 98.8 per cent of their DNA! Though humans also share roughly 60 per cent of their DNA with bananas ...

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
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INTRODUCTION

OUT OF THIS WORLD

"What is THAT?"

In October 2017, Dr. Robert Weryk stood at his desk, flipping through the stack of photos in his hand. They were of the night sky, taken by a giant telescope, and in one of them, he could see something he'd never noticed before. He looked at it more closely. Was it an asteroid? Asteroids are rocky objects that travel around the sun and are smaller than planets—they can be anywhere between hundreds of miles and tens of feet across. At first, this just looked like all the other asteroids Dr. Weryk had seen—a bright streak of light in the sky. But something about it wasn't quite right. So he grabbed a few

more photos taken by the telescope on an earlier night, and he saw this thing again, in a different spot. By looking at the object's position in each photograph, from the first time it showed up until the most recent one, he was able to calculate how quickly it was moving—and, boy, was it moving FAST. A rip-roaring 196,000 miles per hour! Much faster than the average asteroid in our solar system, which travels at only about 56,000 miles per hour. That was his first clue that this object might be different from those he'd seen before.

He got his second clue when he realized that the path it had taken through our solar system wasn't normal. Most of what's in our tiny part of the galaxy is influenced by our sun's gravity, which keeps things like the planets and asteroids moving both at a predictable speed and in a predictable circle or ellipse, known as an orbit. But Dr. Weryk could tell that gravity wasn't the only thing affecting how fast this object was going. It must have already been moving at an incredible speed before it got anywhere near our sun, and because it was moving so fast, it wouldn't be trapped by our sun's gravity and forced into orbit around it.

Adding those two things together, Dr. Weryk realized that whatever it was, it had probably come from *outside* our solar system. That meant it was the very first time scientists had actually seen an interstellar object—an object that came from beyond our own star, the sun, and our solar system. And you better believe that this discovery made scientists, including Dr. Weryk, super excited! They had so many questions, like where had it come from? Where was it headed? And those scientists wouldn't have very much time to get all their questions answered, either. The object had already taken a sort of wide turn around the sun and was headed back out of the

solar system. So they would have just a few weeks to get as much information as they could before the object disappeared from view. In fact, Dr. Weryk said, scientists almost didn't see this object at all. I'm very glad he was paying such close attention!

At this point, you might be wondering how Dr. Weryk happened to have a bunch of telescope photos on his desk. Well, you see, he has a very cool job as a planetary defense researcher. And while that might make you think he's preparing for an alien invasion, he and others like him are actually looking for asteroids that might pose a danger to Earth. To do that, they use a giant telescope known as the Pan-STARRS telescope, which sits at the tippy top of a dormant volcano known as Haleakalā Crater on the island of Maui, in Hawai'i.

atomic bombs, using high-altitude balloons that could pick up the sound waves from the explosions, even if they were thousands of miles away. Of course, the American military didn't want the Soviets to know that we were listening, so it would have kept its program top secret, even after the device crashed. This explanation of what took place at Roswell makes a lot more sense to me than a bunch of unlucky aliens getting hit by lightning in the last leg of their long journey!

Despite all this, the name "Roswell" is practically a synonym for UFOs. The town itself is very proud of the story—the first thing you see on its main street is a giant green "Welcome to Roswell" sign with a cow being abducted by a UFO. (Why do aliens always seem to be abducting cows?) There are also alien-themed restaurants and hotels, and every July, the annual UFO festival I mentioned earlier brings in visitors from all over the country. There's even an International UFO

Museum, which is chock-full of exhibits that re-create the story of the alien crash, and right next door to that is the largest UFO research library in North America. It's packed with books, old (and no longer secret) military reports, papers from scientists, pictures, and anything else you can possibly imagine about aliens on Earth. There are even a few books on Bigfoot—for people who think Bigfoot might have been brought to this planet by aliens!

I'll admit, I was a little disappointed to realize that the Roswell crash probably didn't have anything to do with aliens—not unless someone comes up with some real proof. But there are still lots of other UFO stories out there. And here's something else that's interesting—even though the military said that what happened in Roswell had nothing to do with UFOs or aliens, it has investigated *other* possible UFO sightings. And it wasn't just doing that back in 1947. It was doing that just a few years ago. The military might even be doing that RIGHT NOW.




So if we're going to go looking for alien life—whether it's itsy-bitsy microbes or more like us—we have to narrow down where we're going to look. We talked about this a little bit in the last chapter—about how you'd look for your lost keys under a streetlamp. And since we know there's life on Earth, we'd probably want to start looking for planets that are similar to Earth, because that seems like a likely spot to find life. But if there are two trillion galaxies out there, and each one of those galaxies has as many planets as ours—at least 100 billion . . . I mean, that number is so big, I don't even know where you'd start!

But back in 1961, Dr. Frank Drake came up with an idea about how to narrow down the search, especially the search for advanced aliens. Dr. Drake was an astronomer and astrophysicist—a scientist who uses physics to study how stars and planets work. I went to visit him at his house in California, and he told me about his big eureka moment.

"I realized that you would need to know how many Earths are out there, how often those Earths produced life, how often it was intelligent, and how often it made the kind of technology that we could detect with the devices we have here," Dr. Drake explained.

And that was the start of one of the most famous equations in space history—the Drake Equation. It's a formula that probably every




had lots of mountains and craters. We saw that Jupiter had four large moons orbiting it (and later, we would discover more—scientists now think there could be as many as seventy-nine moons!). And we could see spots on the sun (creatively called "sunspots"), which ended up proving that the sun rotates (and was the first step in proving that Earth orbited the sun, rather than the other way around).

HOW DO TELESCOPES WORK?


When you hear the word *telescope*, you might think about standing in the backyard, looking through a long tube at the sky. I've done this with my dad on a clear, dark night, and we saw the rings of Saturn! His telescope is a reflecting telescope, which is a type of optical telescope, meaning it lets us see things using visible light. While it's smaller and less powerful than the reflecting telescopes that scientists use, it works the same way:

- Light comes in the top end—the part pointed at the sky—and travels down the length of the telescope.
- 2. That light then bounces off a mirror that's at the back end of the telescope. This is called the primary mirror, and it's usually curved (like a shallow dish), which helps focus the light. The size of the telescope has to do with the size of



this mirror, so if someone says they have a twenty-four-inch telescope, it means the mirror at the back of the telescope is twenty-four inches in diameter (which is really big).

- 3. The light bounces off the primary mirror and travels back up the length of the telescope, almost to the very end, to another mirror, called the secondary mirror. It's a much smaller mirror, because the primary mirror has focused the light into a smaller path.
- 4. Then the light gets either reflected up into the eyepiece (for the backyard telescope) or reflected back down the telescope again, where it comes out through a small hole drilled in the primary mirror and into a camera (for scientific telescopes).



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
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

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Precarious. *Adjective.* **1.** Likely to fall or collapse.


